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Jane Pauley

Shares Intimate Journey with Mental Health


On September 12, 200 attendees gathered at Myers Park Country Club in Charlotte for an inaugural luncheon benefiting the Carolinas Behavioral Health Advancement Fund. Guest of honor and featured speaker, Jane Pauley, one of broadcasting's most respected journalists, demonstrated her role as a leading behavioral health advocate. Pauley gained national acclaim as a host on the TODAY show and currently hosts CBS Sunday Morning. She was introduced by Carolinas HealthCare System President and CEO, Eugene Woods, after he shared a brief overview of the System's vision for behavioral health expansion in the region.

A riveted audience was inspired by Pauley as she candidly detailed her own journey and diagnosis of a mental health disorder with Carolinas HealthCare System psychiatrist, Nicole Aho, MD. She emphasized how advocating to normalize others' pursuit of mental wellness has brought her great personal satisfaction, becoming a kind of therapy in her own life. Martha Whitecotton, Senior Vice President of Behavioral Health Services at Carolinas HealthCare System, further inspired the audience with her account of the System's accomplishments in behavioral health since opening the Mindy Ellen Levine Behavioral Health Center, four years ago.

Thanks to the many supporters of the luncheon, the System's behavioral health safety net in the Carolinas will continue to expand. Led by Jane Pauley and **presenting sponsors, AccessOne, The Howard R. Levine Foundation – Howard and Julie Levine, and Lori and Eric Sklut**, the luncheon generated more than \$150,000. These proceeds will support courtyard enhancements at the System's Charlotte-based behavioral health center and underwrite suicide prevention programs and efforts to educate the community about mental illness and substance abuse disorders.

Rian Smith

During Tracie Smith's 20-week ultrasound, she and her husband Chad learned that their unborn child, Rian, had Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome (HLHS) – a life-threatening congenital heart defect in which the left half of the heart does not develop.

Rian's diagnosis was a shock to the family, who lost their first son, Reid, to the same condition. But soon after his diagnosis, Rian's family found comfort and security in their medical team at Levine Children's Hospital.

Serving as a chemotherapy infusion nurse at Carolinas HealthCare System's Levine Cancer Institute, Rian's mother, Tracie, understands the dedication and compassion of her fellow teammates in making sure patients—and their families—receive the care and support they need to survive a complex medical journey.

A multi-specialty care team at Levine Children's Hospital has ensured baby Rian's survival: the Ricky Hendrick cardiovascular intensive care unit sustained his life with the aid of state-of-the-art heart and lung monitors; the support of Child Life Specialists restored a sense of control to the Smith family and gave them the tools and information they needed to have confidence in bringing Rian home; his pediatric cardiologist, Dr. René Herlong, and pediatric cardiac surgeon, Dr. Paul Kirshbom, used their medical expertise to develop a successful treatment plan to address Rian's condition.

All the medical resources, caregivers, and patient services that have allowed Rian to survive—and thrive—are significantly impacted by philanthropy, including the contributions of Children's Miracle Network Hospitals donors and those of many other community supporters.

2017/2018 CHS Gives Campaign

Jeff Gordon Children's Foundation Establishes \$2 Million Endowed Chair for Cancer and Blood Disorders at Levine Children's Hospital

On September 25, Carolinas HealthCare System announced a charitable commitment from the Jeff Gordon Children's Foundation establishing a \$2 million endowed chair in support of academic and research efforts at Levine Children's Hospital. The funds will be designated to create the Jeff Gordon Children's Foundation Endowed Chair in Cancer and Blood Disorders.

Gene Woods, President and CEO of Carolinas HealthCare System, emphasized the importance of endowed chairs in Carolinas HealthCare System's ability to attract and retain the brightest minds in patient care and medical research. "Thanks to private philanthropic support, our researchers have the academic and scientific freedom to pursue ideas that can lead to new treatment options and move medical science forward," Woods said.

Moving forward is second nature for philanthropist and four-time NASCAR Cup Series champion Jeff Gordon, whose competitive spirit not only helped him emerge as a leader in the racing world, but in the race to find a cure for cancer.

"Cancer remains the leading cause of death from disease in children in the United States, and better cures for children with cancer will only come through research," said Gordon, chairman of the Jeff Gordon Children's Foundation. "I've never faced anything on the racetrack as tough as childhood cancer. I won't stop until we beat it."

Javier Oesterheld, MD, who is the Specialty Medical Director at the Levine Children's Hospital Torrence E. Hemby, Jr. Pediatric Hematology, Oncology and Blood and Marrow Transplant Center, has been named the first Jeff Gordon Children's Foundation Endowed Chair. Under Oesterheld's direction, the Center accepted 140 new cancer patients in 2016 and received over 14,900 outpatient visits – making it one of the busiest and most respected hematology, oncology and blood and marrow transplant programs in the Southeast.

Dr. Oesterheld is the principal investigator for the hospital's Developmental Therapeutics program in conjunction with the Carolinas Kids Cancer Research Coalition. He is also the study chair or site principal investigator for multiple clinical research studies into acute leukemia, high-grade non-Hodgkin leukemia, acute myelogenous leukemia and refractory pediatric acute lymphoblastic leukemia. His research has been published in top journals and has led to lecture invitations across the country.



DEAN

Devastating Accident Brings an Unlikely Trio Together


Last fall, triathlete Dean Otto was enjoying one of his daily cycling jaunts down Providence Road when his life changed, mid-pedal. He was struck by a truck and awoke to find himself in the middle of the road, his bike wrapped around him. Little did he know that he had suffered a dangerous spinal cord injury. Timing would be critical with his particular injury, meaning the difference between a wheelchair or regaining the ability to walk.

Thanks to the 2-minute response by Medic, the expertise of clinicians in the Emergency Department at Carolinas Medical Center, and the swift arrival of Carolina Neurosurgery and Spine's Matt McGirt, M.D., the stars aligned that day for Dean Otto. He was in surgery within hours of his accident. But even with the rapid response time, Dean was later told, only a small percentage of patients with an injury as severe as his are able to walk again.

Defying expectations, Dean completed a half-marathon in Napa Valley exactly a year after his crash, with the most unlikely of companions – Will Huffman, the driver who nearly ended his life, and Dr. McGirt, the man who saved it.

The trio's touching story of determination, forgiveness and friendship attracted national news coverage, with the three appearing on the Ellen Show (below, left) and the Today Show. Dean's road to recovery, which began with a ride, may have ended with the race in Napa Valley. But the triathlete's journey is far from over. Thankful for his miraculous recovery, Dean is now raising money to help others with spinal cord injuries. He has raised over \$65,000, included generous support from Shutterfly and Stryker.


Stiletto Sprint—A Good Pair of Heels Saves Lives

The 7th Annual Stiletto Sprint on September 16 brought together survivors, advocates, caregivers, and family and friends, to support those fighting ovarian cancer. Symphony Park at SouthPark was transformed into a sea of teal—the color signifying ovarian cancer awareness. In addition to the 70-yard sprints, this year's event featured local vendors, a Survivors Boutique, raffle and silent auction.

WBTV anchor Micah Smith hosted the event, representing the news station's longstanding commitment to the cause. The Stiletto Sprint began with a moment of silence, balloon release, and inspirational survivors' walk to honor cancer survivors, as well as the memory of those lives lost to ovarian and other forms of gynecologic cancer.

Courage, hope, strength, and passion were prevalent at the emotional event, which raised over \$95,000 for Levine Cancer Institute. 


WANDA SHEARIN





Leukemia Stem Cell Research at Levine Cancer Institute

The Hematologic Oncology and Blood Disorders Program at Levine Cancer Institute (LCI) includes more than a dozen nationally recruited specialists dedicated to treating blood disorders and blood cancers. Among those specialists is **Dr. Jonathan Gerber**, whose research interests focus on advancing treatment options for patients with leukemia. Funds from the inaugural Swim Across America initiative in Charlotte will support Dr. Gerber's innovative research efforts providing a closer look into leukemia stem cells (LSCs). Laboratory research efforts are focused on characterizing LSCs at the cellular and molecular level, in order to identify unique features of LSCs that can be translated into clinical biomarkers and novel therapeutic targets.
